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What are the Seven Steps?

The Seven Steps breaks writing down into seven core techniques:

- Step 1: Plan for Success
- Step 2: Sizzling Starts
- Step 3: Tightening Tension
- Step 4: Dynamic Dialogue
- Step 5: Show, Don't Tell
- Step 6: Ban the Boring
- Step 7: Exciting Endings

Each Step can be taught individually in less than 20 minutes a day. Importantly, Seven Steps teachers create a vibrant writing classroom where students are engaged and writing results rapidly improve!

Students focus on one Step at a time, which allows them to understand, practise and master each individual skill – all before they attempt to write a complete text. This chunking concept is modelled on the way we learn new skills in sport.

The authorial side of writing

Step 2: Sizzling Starts Learn the theory

A story has about 60 seconds to grab the reader and make them want to read on. Find out how to start with a bang using a range of simple and effective techniques.

Pre-test your students' writing

Before you start teaching Sizzling Starts, pre-test your students by having them write the start of a story on one of the following topics:

- The big secret
- A day at the zoo
- My teacher's a monster!

We recommend giving your students five minutes of thinking time and five minutes to write their opening paragraph. You may want to increase the writing time for beginner writers.

Use the test paper on page 10, which includes a quick survey to gauge how students feel about writing. This can be used to check if their levels of confidence and enjoyment are also improving.

Assess students' work using the Step 2: Sizzling Starts marking rubric on the marking sheet provided on page 11. This will give you an insight into your students' current writing abilities.

Step 2: Sizzling Starts Action Activity

Now that you know the Sizzling Starts theory, it's time to jump in with our most popular Action Activity – Five Minute Fast Starts.

This is one of the best ways to get your students practising the Sizzling Starts techniques and writing more creatively.

For accurate results, remember to test your students' writing prior to teaching Step 2: Sizzling Starts. You'll be amazed at the outcomes!

Action Activity: Five Minute Fast Starts

- Read out one of the topics from the table on page 7 and give students one minute to write a Sizzling Start.
- As soon as the minute is up, read out another topic and start the next minute.
- After five minutes, each student should have five different Sizzling Starts.
- Students form groups of 3–4 and share their favourite Sizzling Start.

Five Minute Fast Starts tips

Run this activity every day for an entire week to build up students' muscle memory.

Don't worry about neat handwriting or spelling just now. The goal is to capture creative ideas fast!

Don't ask students to share all of the Sizzling Starts they've written. Reading everything out doesn't give them the opportunity to make mistakes, play around with ideas or try new things that don't work.

Encourage students to share their favourite Sizzling Start in small groups. This will help them generate more ideas, develop concepts and learn from each other.

The idea is to practise, practise, practise. The more students do this, the easier it will get.

ASSESS

Step 2: Sizzling Starts Assess and celebrate

After running the Five Minute Fast Starts Action Activity every day for a week, use the self-assessment rubric on page 12 to help your students evaluate their own progress.

Conference with students to identify whether they have mastered Step 2: Sizzling Starts or whether they need more practice to consolidate their understanding.

Post-test your students' writing

Once students have practised Step 2: Sizzling Starts for 1-2 weeks, post-test their writing using the test paper provided on page 10 to measure the improvement in their narrative writing skills, as well as their level of confidence and enjoyment.

Choose the same topic as for the pre-test (or one of a similar difficulty level) and mirror the pre-test conditions as closely as possible.

Mark students' work using the same rubric and marking sheet as before and compare the results.
